### Where we meet


We meet at the Jubilee United Church, 40 Underhill Drive, Toronto, Ontario. Please enter the church by the north door.

# How to get there:

**Driving**: Take the Don Valley Parkway, exit east on Lawrence Ave. Turn left at the first intersection, Underhill Drive and continue north two blocks to the church. There is ample free parking.

**Public Transportation:** Take the Lawrence Ave. bus Route#54 from the Yonge and Eglinton subway station. Exit the bus at Underhill Drive and walk two blocks north to the church.

Or take the Woodbine 91C bus from the Woodbine Station on the Bloor-Danforth subway line. This bus goes up Underhill Drive, past the church.
